BOE Non-renews Veteran Teacher's Contract

The West Kingman County Board of Education meeting was called to order at 7:01 p.m. on Monday, April 13, 2020, by President Scott DeWeese.

President, Scott DeWeese; Vice-President, Brent Hansen; Members, Joyce Gridley, Brent Miller, Travis Thimesch, Kurt Preisser, Vicki Oldham; Superintendent, Robert Reed; and Clerk, Stacy Webster.

Motion made by Kurt Preisser, seconded by Joyce Gridley, to approve the agenda as presented. Motion carried 7-0.

Motion made by Kurt Preisser, seconded by Brent Miller, to approve the minutes of the March 9, 2020 Regular meeting. YMotion carried 7-0. .

Motion made by Vicki Oldham, seconded by Brent Miller, to approve the minutes of the March 30, 2020 Special meeting. Motion carried 7-0.

Motion made by Brent Hansen, seconded by Vicki Oldham, to approve the payment of bills in the amount of \$258,406.85 and the financial reports as presented. Motion carried 7-0.

Mr. Reed reported to the board that our Continuous Learning Plan has been submitted and approved by KSDE. He shared that the staff has reported that things are going well. He also shared the challenges and changes to the food service program. Superintendent Reed also visited with the board about Drivers Ed and possible dates for a Graduation ceremony.

The Education Co-op held a Zoom meeting that Member Joyce Gridley was unable to attend. Superintendent Reed will have a meeting with the Co-op tomorrow. Nothing to report at this time.

Annual Sewer Cleaning

begins Thursday,

April 23

Mayer Specialty Services, LLC., Goddard, KS will be in Cunningham April 23, 2020 for maintenance work on the city's sewer system. The area to be cleaned this year is the South part of town (everything south of First Street and including the area west of N. Douglas Street and south of W. Third Street on the north part of town).

Residents of the area to be cleaned are encouraged to take the following precautions on the days sewers will be cleaned:

Cover all floor drains with plastic and place a weight on the plastic.

Cover all toilets with plastic and close the lid on the plastic.

If you should notice an unpleasant odor, run water into each drain to re-fill the traps.

Sewer lines can develop air pressure or a partial vacuum from the cleaning process. Usually any excess air pressure or vacuum will dissipate through plumbing vents, but occasionally there are homes with inadequate vents, obstructed vents, or no vents at all. In the case of inadequate venting air pressure could escape through the toilet, sink, tub, shower or floor drains causing water to splash out. Or, a vacuum could draw water out of plumbing traps allowing an unpleasant odor to escape.

During the cleaning, which should be completed during the day, water and drains may be used as normal.

If the cleaning will require an additional day, city maintenance workers will notify the affected addresses.

Department for Children and Families Announces Hero Relief Program

Program provides child care subsidies to eligible health care workers, first responders and other essential workers

Governor Laura Kelly and DCF Secretary Laura Howard today announced efforts to support parents and child-care providers during the COVID-19 pandemic. The "Hero Relief Program" expands DCF's child care assistance subsidies for families and provides financial support directly to child care providers. The new program specifically targets health care workers, first responders and other essential workers.

"We know these essential workers are risk-

ing their health every day to protect others," Kelly said. "The Hero Relief Program is our way of saying 'we've got your back' by making sure families have access to quality affordable child care."

Beginning Monday, April 20, child care subsidies will be available to essential workers who financially qualify. The list includes:

- Health care workers (including RNs, other medical professionals and health care support workers, hospital and laboratory staff)

- First responders (including law enforcement, fire and rescue, and other public safety workers)

- Food and agriculture workers

- Judicial branch (essential services)

- National Guard

- Child and adult protective service specialists

- Child care providers caring for children of eligible workers listed above

In order to qualify, families must have countable gross income at or below 250% of the federal poverty level. For an average family of four that equals a monthly income of \$5,458. Families will receive the full DCF subsidy amount based on their family size, with no family-share deduction.

"During a time when these everyday heroes are working long hours, we hope this program helps relieve some of the financial burden they're experiencing," Howard said. "It's our duty to support families during this uncertain time so we encourage families to apply."

The Hero Relief Program also supports child care providers by providing a menu of stipends and grants to assist during the pandemic.

Grants may include:

- Sustainability stipends for all KDHE-licensed child care and relative providers to help pay for ongoing expenses like food, supplies, labor and rent/mortgage.


- Revenue replacement subsidies for DCF enrolled child care providers

- Supply grants to assist with pandemic related expenses like gloves, disinfectants, soap and other necessary items.

- Emergency worker support bonuses – a one-time bonus to providers who care for children of health care workers and first responders.

At 3:45, I thought about my trip to the grocery earlier that day. I thought about the small bag of potato chips I bought. I could see it laying on top of the microwave. The red bag of wavy chips. Salted and crunchy. "I bought those to eat with sandwiches" I told myself.... "For sandwiches.... Sandwiches.... Sandwiches... just sandwiches." I was hungry.

"There is salad in the fridge. It is crunchy and I could add some salt to it.... but I had that for supper.... Didn't fill me up much."

At 4:00 I got up, opened my bedroom door and was greeted by a passel of pussycats who must have heard my tossing and turning. We all meandered out to the kitchen.

Boris: "Are you up? Are you alright? I'm here. What are you doing?"

Ned: "Is it time to be annoying? I'm hungry! Feed us!"

In the kitchen, I put out some cat food. Checked the bag of chips on top of the microwave. Hm. Looked in the fridge at the salad. Hm. Back to the chips... Waait... there, setting in front of the microwave was a tiny bit of banana nut bread (pecans not walnuts) that I'd made on Sunday. Not salty or crispy, but yummy and filling. I put a small slice on a plate, poured a small glass of milk and worked Sunday's crypto quip.

I returned to bed about 4:15 and was out like a light.

I woke later when one of the cats thought it was

time to get up. Yep, 7:15 would be a good time to get up...in about an hour. I gave the dogs a treat to tide them over until I got up to feed them. After an hour or so of reading, I fed the dogs, then I ate breakfast. I had a sandwich...and.... you guessed it, potato chips.

Then I felt like tackling all the worries that were racing through my brain during the night.

My friend, Lori Branine, will be greatly missed by so many: her fellow teachers and her students; her family and friends and church members.

I have included Lori's obituary/life celebration in this paper as I have many friends from the Belle Plaine/Derby/Mulvane area who read the paper – either printed or on-line. It is my tribute to a fine, fine person.

Lori loved teaching and she loved her students. I am sure if you asked her, she'd remember most of the 100's of students who have sat in her library and listened to stories and checked out books and learned to love reading because of her. She was a veteran of many years of teaching.

Veteran educators bring so much to the world that is their classroom. Oh, sure, a new teacher is full of excitement and energy and plans and ideas; but a teacher who has been teaching for 30 or 40 years brings wisdom and knowledge and dedication and devotion to a profession that is difficult and strenuous and at the mercy of higher powers.

Veteran teachers can silence a room of students with a look. They know all the places that work (and don't work) for field trips. They wear safety pins under the corner of their shirt. They stay calm and cool in crises, because they've been there and done that.

A veteran teacher knows all the tricks of students and parents and administrators. They have taught two or three generations of the same family and know many of their secrets. They can navigate the roiling waters of change with finesse and dignity.... They have seen it all several times.

Lori, you will missed. You will always be loved for your dedication to learning and reading and kids.

Veteran teachers, you are what makes education great. Thank for your decades of service. You know who you are.

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City Council to Meet Monday through Zoom

On Monday, April 27th at 6:30 p.m., the Cunningham City Council will conduct its monthly meeting through Zoom, a remote conferencing service that combines video conferencing, online meetings, and chat. Council members will be able to attend the meeting from their home, place of business, or wherever they are using a mobile phone, tablet or computer. Members of the public will also have access to the meeting using the same devices. A phone option is available, although the numbers provided by the service are not toll free.

Those attending the meeting must sign in, whether using a phone or computer. Upon sign-in all participants are muted. The meeting host can unmute participants individually or as a group, which will allow time for public comments. The meet-

Helpful Hints for City meetings in Zoom

1. What is Zoom? Zoom is a digital conferencing service that will allow meetings to be broadcast on the internet to devices such as computers, tablets, and phones. Nobody will have such a number, so please press # again as the system will request.

8. Thanks for your Patience. Please understand that we are working extremely hard to make these systems work, but we expect there will be glitches and things we have not expected. We are doing everything we know to provide this vital service as easily accessible as possible. This is a learning experience for everyone. We thank you in advance for your cooperation.


It was announced that the fair facilities raffle would be pushed back.




Any 4-H members who were going to Regional 4-H Days were able to participate in a virtual version of the event, so that they could still perform.



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
